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Course Description


Discover New York will encourage you to engage intellectually and personally with the global city that not only houses St. John's University, but also serves as home to people from literally all over the world. This course focuses on issues of immigration, race, and ethnicity and their impact upon the economic, cultural, religious, and social development of New York City in the 21st century. In terms of experiential learning, you will participate regularly in structured workshop activities designed to increase your awareness of issues of diversity and their personal relevance to living, learning and working in a global society. Moreover, with the incorporation of Academic Service Learning, you will experience the city as a place populated with real people, many of whom live in difficult situations and need assistance. In addition to the required readings outlined below, supplemental materials will be posted to the course site.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, students will:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of New York City history, especially through the theme of immigration.
- 2. Demonstrate a basic knowledge of information literacy skills.
- 3. Demonstrate a basic facility with critical thinking skills.
- 4. Experience a significant cultural and educational aspect of New York City.
- 5. Learn about and experience the mission of the University.
- 6. Demonstrate awareness and behaviors appropriate to the transition to higher education.



Course Requirements


- Mid-Term and Final Examinations: The mid-term (10/16) and final (12/18)
 examinations will be based on assigned readings, lecture notes, video presentations,
 and in-class activities.
- Research Assignment: Prof. Livermore will lead you in the development of a research assignment that will result in the submission of a short research paper. Divided into four individual assignments, the due dates are: 1) 10/6; 2) 10/13; 3) 10/27; and 4) 11/3. The final paper is due 11/17. - Academic Service-Learning: Academic Service-Learning (AS-L) at SJU is a classroom/experiential site- based program that involves students in some form of required community service that benefits the common (public) good and uses service as a means of understanding course concepts. The service activity meets course objectives, and through reflection students examine issues pertaining to social justice and responsibility. AS-L is a requirement of this course; all students must complete six hours of service at a selected service agency. In order to link what you'll learn in the service project to what's learned in the classroom, reflection of the AS-L experience will be in the form of a paper due 12/4 (detailed information on the assignment can be found on our MySJU course site). www.stjohns.edu/asl

- Extra Credit: Upon your participation in <u>two</u> of the above events, five extra credit points can be earned for attending each <u>additional</u> activity (maximum 10 points). Points earned will be applied toward your examination scores.
- Cultural Autobiography: You will be asked to submit a typed autobiographical narrative that incorporates a number of culturally based questions and themes. Please refer to the assignment sheet posted on our MySJU course site for more detailed information. The draft of this assignment is due 9/18; the final paper is due 10/2.
- Cultural Reflection Assignment (Oral Presentation): Each student will deliver an oral presentation based on an assignment to be given later in the semester. Evidence of written preparation for the assignment, as well as the oral delivery itself, will be assessed in determining the overall grade of your presentation.
- Attendance: Since this course meets only once a week, you are required to attend all
 sessions and stay for the entire meeting. Students are permitted one excused absence.
 After this one absence, penalties to your grade will be assessed. Missing more than
 three (3) classes will result in a failing portion of the participation component of your
 grade. Please note that any late assignment will have points deducted.
